Sisters and brothers in Christ -

This summer we are going to be following two books of the Bible for our lessons.

For the first reading we will follow Genesis. We will hear about Abraham following God's call, about him taking his son Isaac up the mountain, about the feud between Jacob and Esau, about Jacob wrestling with God. Genesis is a messy story, a story of favorites, a story of people making the wrong choices and still being loved by God. It is ultimately a human story – a story that (to riff off of Star Wars) involved people a long time ago in a land a long way a way. At the same time they are people that might seem familiar to us: they have our passions, our faults, our failings and our aspirations. It can be easy to read Genesis and wonder why God chose this family.

At least until we think about our own families, our own faults and struggles and realize that Abraham's family would fit right in with ours. Abraham's family aren't paragons. What is remarkable is that they heard God's call and followed it in faith. Genesis is a reminder that God can love a broken, fallible family.

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Like the family of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob, we are called to hear and follow God in faith. Their story can be a reminder to us that God's love transcends human brokenness.

Matthew is an `insider' gospel. It seems to have been written for a specific community (some have suggested a Christian community near the city of Antioch). The language of Matthew (for example using kingdom of heaven rather than kingdom of God) reflects a community that had it's own dialects and traditions.

Though Matthew has insider language, the call of Jesus in the gospel – in all the gospels is clear, to go out from a sheltered community to engage the wider world. This was challenge for that community: to face scorn and persecution, to lose connection to family and friends, to risk the wrath of the pagan communities surrounding them.

It is a challenge for our community as well. How do we reach out when we are not gathering, how do we take care of each other from a distance?

We are relearning old skills – sending cards, calling friends, re establishing routines of reading scripture in the morning. I have spoken to some of you who planted more than you have in years, who are cooking and baking like you never have before. And I know that some of you have made masks, have prayed for those in need, have given to food banks, have donated to charities. Our time is a challenge – a different challenge, but still a challenge. God's call to love God and neighbor remains the same.

Hey all, it has been both strange and surreal to be so isolated but also so aware of and immersed in the goings on of the communities around us. Things that are near can seem far away and things happening miles away can seem as if they are right next door. We are living in a time of contradictions where the world feels both bigger and smaller than it has ever been. But despite the uncertainty, when we cling to each other (in a safe and socially distance manner, of course!) things have a way of feeling more sure, more safe, more *normal.*. To that end we over here in Youth Land have made efforts to periodically check in with each other. We have had a couple of zoom calls, one was even on a birthday! We didn't spotlight any activities on these calls, but just enjoyed the company of familiar faces with whom we didn't share a toilet. As important as family can be during times is uncertainty, community fills a need that family just doesn't. Those we see regularly and periodically are just as important as those we see everyday. So from us in Youth Land, a challenge: reach out to someone with whom you interact only infrequently and see how much joy it can bring.

The council recently approved the purchase of a new camera. We are working to learn the technology so that we can send out smoother, clearer videos for those that chose to watch from home.

These outdoor services will be following the same rules as worship on June 21st: wear a mask, bring a chair, we will be gathering outside, bring your own communion elements. (Masks are required) If you don't have a mask, we have some on hand and will provide one for you.

If you wish to park on Walnut street for a shorter walk or enter the yard from the Queen Avenue side, you may consider those as options as well. If you choose to not come (due to following OHA protocols regarding those who are 60+ or with underlying health conditions (or for whatever reason) know that sermons will continue to be recorded and bulletins sent out.

While we are trying to be as thorough as possible with our plans for the summer. Our worship services are outdoors because that seems to be the number one way that we can reduce risk of transmission of COVID-19 (our other measures exist because we are taking a comprehensive approach to risk manage-

ment). At the same time, we recognize that the situation regarding the virus is fluid. We have seen cases and deaths rise in mid to late June. Our plans for outdoor services are just that - plans. If the state health situation warrants a change in those plans (for good or ill) we will let you know via email, postal mail and phone call.

If you wish to be a part of a phone tree to keep in touch with our membership, please speak to Nancy about volunteering.

Finally, just a reminder to reach out to each other. Send cards, send emails, call each other on the phone. Check in to see how people are doing. Pray for our church members, pray for our leadership on council and for our employees, pray for public servants, pray for those in need. Pray, pray, pray!



There will be a Zoom Bible study on Wednesdays in July (other than perhaps the 29th). We are working our way through St Paul's letter to the church at Thessaloniki (doing a chapter a week so July 1 is the second chapter, July 8 is the third chapter, July 15 is the fourth chapter and July 22 is the fifth and final chapter). We may continue with 2ndThessalonians (or we may not) at the end of the month.

1st Thessalonians is probably the first book of the New Testament that is completed and reached its final form - many scholars estimate around the year 47. You could read the (brief) first chapter and join us for our study starting on July 1st.


