

Sisters and brothers in Christ,


The church year always ends and begins in the same way, reflecting a conversation Jesus has with his disciples in Holy Week. I am sharing a reflection on it here because it has to bear in our lives as well.

As we are told in the gospels of Mark, Matthew and Luke, on the Monday of Holy Week Jesus goes into the Temple in Jerusalem and creates a huge scene, throwing the moneychangers out. He shouts that they are turning his father's house into a den of thieves.

The next day, Tuesday, Jesus is immediately confronted as he enters the Temple. He has threatened the power structure of his world. All the powers of the world array themselves against him: the chief priests, elders, scribes, Pharisees, Sadducees, Herodians and of course the Romans. A tense day of arguments ensues. After that day Jesus and his disciples are walking back to Bethany (the suburbs of Jerusalem) where they are spending the night. They stop in the garden of Gethsemane. Surrounded by the gnarled shapes of olive trees, looking at the gleaming marble and gold of the Temple, Jesus tells his disciples that everything is going to change.

This speech is found in Mark 13, Luke 21 and Matthew 24. There are small variations between the gospels, however the emphasis is generally the same.

Jesus tells his disciples that the Temple, the massive building complex in Jerusalem is going to come down. All the buildings, all the walls, not one stone, he says, will be on another. He speaks of

unrest and tumult, first in a fairly general sense, then later in a more specific sense.

Christians since that point have tried to look at this as a roadmap to predict the future, <u>despite</u> the fact that Jesus says that no one knows the hour or the day, not even the Son (Mark 13:32). And by doing that, we miss what he is trying to tell us.

Our time, like Jesus time, is a time of uncertainty and unrest. Our news speaks of famines, wars and rumors of war and natural disasters, just as Jesus warns about. But what matters for his disciples, for us, and for the billions of Christians throughout history is his reminder: do not be afraid (Mark 13:7). God is with us through all of this.

Whatever is going on in the world, is in God's care and keeping. We do not need to be afraid of the uncertainties of the times, whatever they may be, for we are ultimately God's. Whatever happens, we belong to God. So whatever the uncertainties of this life, whatever the uncertainties of this world, we do not need to worry or be alarmed, for we belong to Christ.

What Jesus also tells his disciples, and us, and all Christians at all times is this: stay awake (Mark 13:37). We aren't to worry about pandemic, or political uncertainty, or inflation, or anything else. We are instead to keep doing that which he has shown us and told us – a radical, all inclusive, love of God and neighbor. Jesus message, which we will see again and again as we read through Luke's gospel this year, is consistent: that everyone in all the world, from homeless shepherds to mighty kings, from peasant girls in the hill country to soldiers, everyone is a part of God's family. Everyone who follows Christ in hope and love has a future, whatever else may come.

So my sisters and brothers, what I say to you this advent season is: do not be afraid and stay awake in Christ.

Finding Liturgy in Life and Life in Liturgy

An Oregon Synod Lay Education Course

How does liturgy shape us? How might we shape it? Gather with people from across the Oregon Synod this January and February to explore liturgy in daily life, communal worship, and public witness. We'll pay particular attention to the seasons of the church year, the flow of worship, the invitation of sacraments, and daily practices that help us cultivate a life of depth and meaning. We'll create space for the integration of blessing, celebration, lamentation, prayer, song, symbols, and ritual crafting. You're encouraged to bring your whole self as we seek to live in holy rhythm. Pr. Matta Ghaly will be the primary instructor. The course is designed with a Lutheran lens and inclusive heart; all are welcome.

This on-line course is offered through the Oregon Synod's <u>SALM and Lay Education Program</u>. We'll meet the following eight Tuesday evenings on Zoom from 6:30-8pm (Pacific Time): January 11, January 18, January 25, February 1, February 8, February 15, February 22, and March 1. Authentic participation and relationship-building are the priority. Course participants and/or their congregations are encouraged to donate, as they are able, on a sliding scale between \$20-\$160, but donations are not required to register.
